

# FROM THE DESK OF THE DIRECTOR

### - BETH REEVES

"Just look forward." "Do the best you can leave the rest to God." My parents instill this into me everytime that I see them. This also mirrors the echo of Ruby Bridges' parents. I see myself in Ruby. No matter how much chaos or fear that was around either of us, love always prevailed. We are both little black girls raised in the south who knew that everything that we did was based off of the seeds of faith that were strategically planted into us. Our families' faith, community love, and rich heritage served as a beacon of light that impacted others. I must say that Ruby's light beamed much brighter in much more horrifying times. This story makes me think of David and Goliath. Often faced with giants all around her, her courage was a light that shined through the darkness of people's fear and hatred. She always heard the aria and cadence of her parents' voices. After spending time with this script as a director, I might think that the cadence of Ruby's heartbeat might sound like the following:

Just look forward- "Faith is"...love. All that Ruby knew was love. Her mother and father were faithful, cultivating seeds of determination and love into her. The two most precious offerings thatRuby's parents shared were faith and love. It was black love that led Ruby into the William Frantz School. It was black love that nurtured her belief. It was black love that kept the family together.

Just look forward- " ...the substance of things hoped for"... Ruby's imagination served what she hoped for. She hoped every color would come together. Everytime we see her hope/imagination we see a rainbow of colors. Alma Thomas', artist and native of Columbus, Ga., picture serves as a metaphor for Ruby's imagination during moments with Mrs. Henry during the play. According to the Smithsonian, Thomas was an exuberant colorist, abstracting shapes and patterns from the trees and flowers around her. Ruby and Alma admired the beauty of trees. Trees allowed them to escape their reality. It gave them hope.

Just look forward- "the evidence of things not seen"... I don't believe that Ruby Bridges could have imagined that her footsteps would lead the paths for other little black girls by the names of Shirley Chisolm, Maxine Waters, Vice President Kamala Harris, Associate Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson...and even me.

Me. This script chose me. Collaborating with playwright and my friend, Natalia Temesgan, has truly been one of the best experiences. It has been an honor to direct her words and art. As Ruby had an assignment to act out on her faith, my assignment was to make sure that you see that her faith outweighed any fear. I had the opportunity to teach about Ruby Bridges to South Columbus Elementary School. They learned that one is never too small to make a big difference. Students were able to focalize how she displayed bravery. Using arts integration as a resource, students empathized and expressed the meaning of her tenacity and perseverance. Perseverance. I dedicate this performance to Ruby Bridges, The Little Rock Nine, The Four Little Girls of Birmingham, The McDonogh Three, Linda Brown, James Meredith, and Dr. Janet Bussey.

## FROM THE DESK OF THE DRAMATURG

### - ADAMA JOY SALL

### We stand on the shoulders of Black Women.

Black women who are courageous, changemakers, trailblazers and activists. At just six years old, a kind, gentle and smart black girl with a courageous spirit and a faith so strong, changed the world in ways that still affect us today. Her bravery led her to be the first black student to integrate an elementary school in the south. Despite hateful people, callous remarks, and cruel actions being thrown at this child daily, **like the phoenix, she rose.** 

She continued to wake up every morning and attend school, thus embodying what it is to be an activist, no matter how small. The strides she took made it possible for more black children to receive better educational opportunities, further cultivating the land in which seeds of hope, change, and excellence, sewn by our ancestors, continues to flourish.

The doors forced open and left ajar by this little black girl in 1964, have made way for black women such as Vice President Kamala Harris and Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson to walk through them with pride today! Born in the same year of Ruby's historymaking efforts, Kamala Harris remembers having a "stroller-eye view of the Civil Rights movement" as she accompanied her mother to marches (Rothberg). The activists and changemakers of the civil rights movement such as Ruby Bridges, inspired Harris to fight against injustice and



oppression in her own career as she went on to be the first woman to serve as California's Attorney General in 2010. After a decade of dedication and work as an attorney general and senator, she made history as the first woman, African-American, and Indian-American to be sworn in as Vice President of the United States.

This very year brought another first for Black women that advances the hope of equality for us all, Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson advanced into the role of associate justice of the US Supreme Court. Sworn into office on June 30, 2022, Brown Jackson became the 1st Black woman to serve on the highest court of the land. Both VP Harris and Justice Brown Jackson have inspired an entire generation of little black boys and girls that their goals and dreams are possible.

Please refrain from talking to your neighbor during the performance, as it can be distracting to other audience members as well as the performers on stage.



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

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


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
